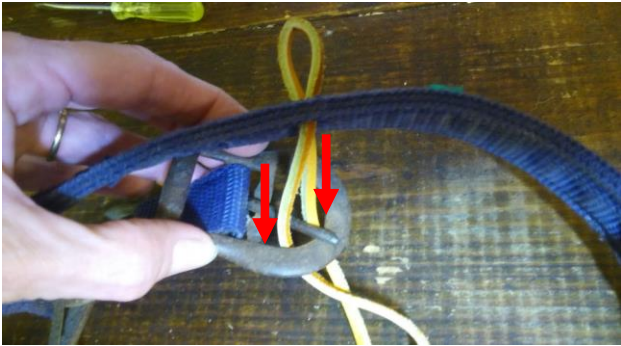
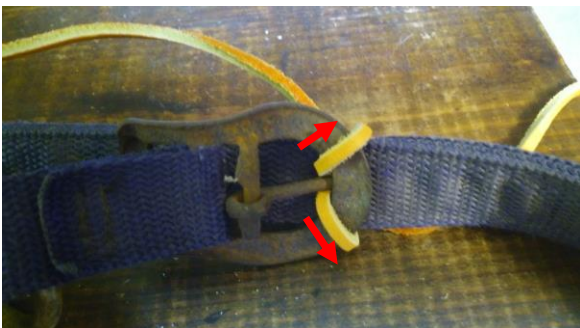


## How To Make a Regular Halter Into a Breakaway

1. Get a 20" to 24" long cord of leather or heavy string. Fold in half, and use a small screw driver to push the leather from the underside through the hole that you usually use to fasten the halter. Leave a loop on the outside of the halter strap. Run the 2 leather ends through the buckle, one on either side of the metal tongue.



2. Wrap the leather ends around the underside of the buckle and bring back to the top.



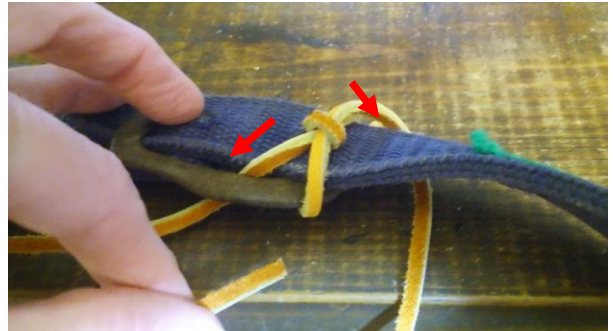
3. Thread the leather ends through the loop poking through the halter.



4. Run the loose end of the halter strap through the bottom part of the buckle, as though you were finishing buckling the halter on your horse.



5. Pull the leather loop down to the underside and tighten the cord around the buckle. Next, thread the cord between the halter strap and the buckle on each side, taking the cord back to the underside of the halter.



6. Thread each side of the cord across the underside of the buckle and up through the buckle on the other side; pull tight. This helps to hold the tongue firmly against the halter, so it can't slip.



7. Make sure the cord is comfortably tight and tie it off on the outside. The halter will stay firmly on your horse UNLESS it gets caught and the horse pulls back hard—after all, the purpose is to have it break if the horse gets hung up on a fence, tree, etc. DO NOT tie your horse with a breakaway halter unless you're willing to risk him pulling hard enough to break free.
